#### **QUESTION TIME**

**Bentham Community Primary School** class 4 visited Ingleton Quarry and walked around the perimeter to two different viewing points with Quarry Manager John McGregor and John Peate. Afterwards they asked questions of John Peate back at the school.

Clapham Church of England Primary School Junior School children were involved. They had one visit as part of the Musical Rocks project, when they went down into the bottom of Dry Rigg Quarry, and later during this project they walked around the perimeter through the wetland area of Swarthmoor to a viewing point and on to the railhead at Arcow Quarry. Both visits were led by Michael Cardus and Carl Lambert. On the second visit the focus was on environmental issues, restoration, local landscape and creatures. The children had a Question Time with Mark Corner, Chairman of Friends of the Dales, and concluded that on balance quarrying was not a good thing to have in a National Park.

**Giggleswick Junior School** class 5 visited Horton Quarry with John Peate, Principal Geologist for Hanson. The mini bus driver, Peter Monks, had many years ago repaired the workers cottages at the quarry and his father and other members of his family had been quarrymen there. The recently closed Giggleswick Quarry could be seen from the school classroom. After their visit they had a conversation with Carl Lis OBE. Because Carl had worked for many years at Ingleton and Horton Quarries and was currently Chairman of the YDNPA they were able to consider the issues in a balanced way.

Horton-in-Ribblesdale Primary School was due to close for ever on the day following the visit to Horton Quarry. The 12 children that remained in the school visited the quarry with John Peate, Hanson's Principal Geologist and afterwards had a conversation with Keith Humphrey and David Gallivan, former quarry workers. Although the children could have easily walked to the Quarry from the school they were taken above the quarry in a minibus so they could view the quarry in its entirety and see it in the context of the Pen-y-Ghent and surrounding Dales.

Ingleton Primary School class 6 was recorded in a question and answer session with Ingleton Quarry Manager, John McGregor, following their recorded debate about whether there should be quarrying in the Yorkshire Dales. In preparation for the debate they also had an unrecorded conversation with Carl Lis OBE, Chairman of the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority (YDNPA), former quarry manager and Chairman of the School Governors. Ingleton Quarry is scheduled for closure in 2020. Following the debate the class were strongly in favour of continuing quarrying because of the economic benefits to the community.
